The collection contains some 50 "pun-stories," stories that lead up to absoutely outrageous pun endings. In this collection you will read Brett's puns with appreciation for this own language, and as you read, occasionally you will anticipate an ending; more often you won't, but as he holds you in suspense, the reward at the end of each story is always worth the entertaining read.
