My title is the explanation that accompanies the drawing on page 56, with eleven identical customers seated at a lunch counter, giving their order to a waitress. It is humorous, might even bring a smile to your face; but would hardly make one break out laughing. To me the best cartoon is the one on the cover. I'd be surprised if the cartoon on page 83 made anyone break out laughing.
