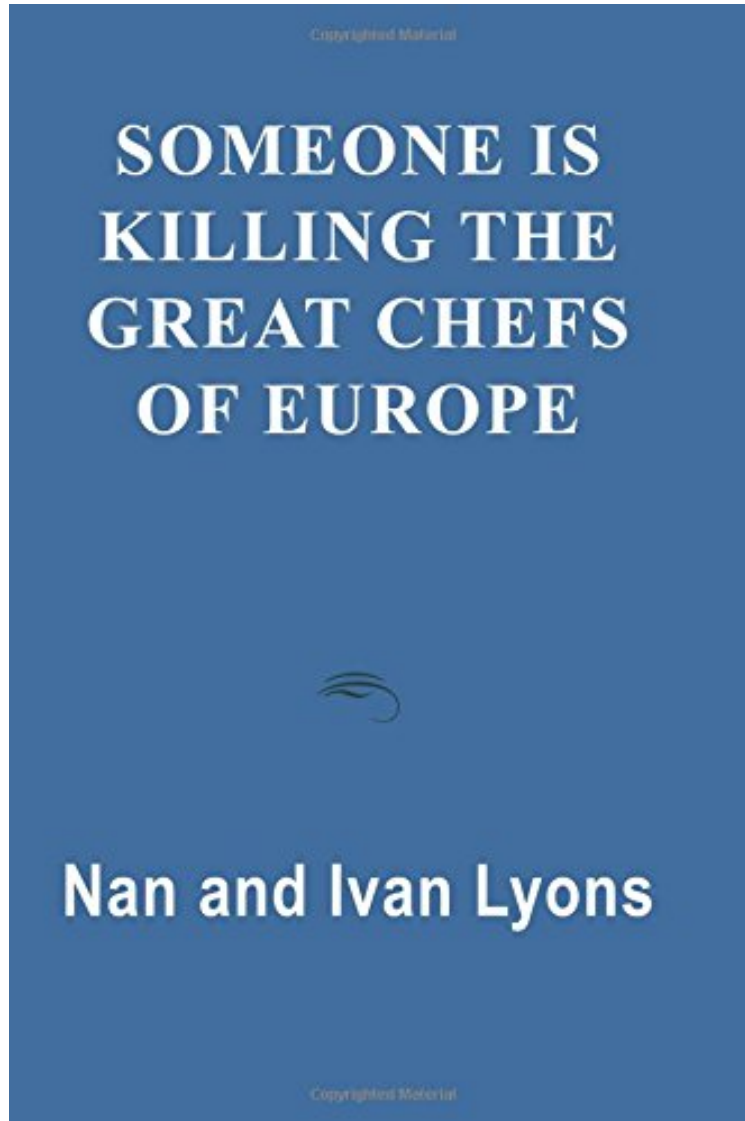


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Someone is Killing the Great Chefs of Europe

In collaboration with her husband Ivan, she wrote the first novel with a food background, *Someone is Killing the Great Chefs of Europe* which was then made into a major motion picture. They went on to write four other novels as well as scores of articles on food and travel. Her newest book, *Around the World in 80 Meals* (Red Rock Press) was published in late 2010. Nan has most recently been made Associate Editor for "Let's Travel" a new website which features interviews as well as podcasts and articles on every aspect of travel. Her particular expertise is focused on restaurants, shopping and luxury hotels.
